About the ECLO Service

Eye Care Liaison Officers (ECLOs) have lots of knowledge on eye conditions and on helpful local and national services.

By offering dedicated individual care, ECLOs can talk to you about your worries and give you advice on how to lessen the impact your eye condition may have on your life.

ECLOs act as an important bridge between health and social services and are central to the support and wellbeing of patients in eye clinics. They also help prevent avoidable sight loss, by talking through treatment and helping people to understand their medication if necessary.

Congratulations Sarah!

Huge congratulations to Sarah Fortescue for winning a bronze medal for tennis at the World Blind Games this year.

The games, run by IBSA (International Blind Sports Association), happen every four years and are recognised as a key international tournament outside of the Paralympics for visually impaired sport.

Consisting of 10 different sports, including goalball, this was the first year that tennis was included. The event is held in a different country each time, but Sarah didn't have far to travel as the UK hosted the games in Birmingham.

This year Sarah also played at Wimbledon in the first ever VI Finals Tournament.

We first featured Sarah in 2017 when she had been selected as a reserve for Great Britain (GB) at the International Blind Tennis Tournament in Spain. Two years later we interviewed Sarah for the newsletter after she was selected to play for GB in the tournament and later went on to win bronze!

Following her fantastic achievement of winning another bronze medal we caught up with her again.

How many tennis players were at the games?

Between 60-70. Both single and doubles games were played, in doubles my partner and I narrowly missed winning a bronze medal. It was a shame we came so close, but I was thrilled to bring back a medal in the singles.

Did you bring your own sighted helper with you?

No, we stayed in student accommodation at the university and volunteers showed us around and explained how everything worked. Our two GB coaches were on hand to provide any other assistance we needed. It was all very well organised.



BucksVision Milton Keynes Area sponsor you, do you have a message for them?

I would like to send a big thank you. Travelling around the country to play in tournaments is expensive and getting sponsorship is extremely difficult. I am very grateful for their support.

So what's next for Sarah Fortescue the tennis player?

More of the same! There are lots of players coming along and the competition becomes harder. I plan to continue to enjoy the game and play to my best ability. There are always things to improve and work on, so it keeps me on my toes!

What would you say to someone looking to try a new hobby?

If I can inspire and encourage anyone to have a go at anything, be it sport, art or music, I would say don't think that you can't do it. I nearly didn't try tennis because I thought I wouldn't be able to see well enough to track the ball, but I did and it's made a huge difference to my confidence and my life, as well as having fun along the way!

And how would they start playing tennis?

LEGO[®] Braille Bricks

Text from RNIB Website

Children use play to explore the world around them and learn in a number of different ways. LEGO[®] Braille Bricks is a playful tool to teach braille to children with vision impairment, tested and developed by the LEGO Foundation in collaboration with RNIB. It is widely available within education establishments, from local authorities in the UK, and in online shops.

RNIB developed a toolkit to promote the use of bricks as an educational tool; it comprises of LEGO bricks that have been adjusted to correspond to the Unified English Braille alphabet. Each LEGO brick also has a printed letter or character to ensure the tool is inclusive allowing sighted teachers, students and family members to play on equal terms with a child with vision impairment.

A selection of signature LEGO brick colours has been chosen specifically to ensure colour contrast and allow for a playful learning experience in an inclusive setting.

The toolkit is accompanied by a teaching concept that builds on a learning through play approach, including ideas for socially interactive activities with the bricks.

The aim is for children to start to use touch to identify different dot combinations and learn braille in a fun way.

Energy Doctor Scheme



Letter to Residents from Buckinghamshire Council.

Are you struggling with energy bills? You may be able to get some help. If you are a homeowner or rent your home from a private landlord, you could get free energy saving advice and free energy saving equipment installed in your home through our Energy Doctor scheme.

An Energy Doctor can give you advice and help you by installing free energy saving items to reduce your energy costs and carbon emissions You could get free: Portable solar generators; Door, window and letterbox draught excluders; Chimney draught excluders; Hot water cylinder Jackets; Reflective radiator panels; Electricity consumption monitors; LED lightbulbs; and Thermometer cards.

They can also give you advice about ways you can reduce your energy costs and support you could get (including funding and grants) to help you with sustainable energy measures such as insulation.

You could get a free visit from one of our Energy Doctors if:

- you rent the property through a private rental agreement, or own and live in the property;

- your household has an income of £30,000 or less (before tax), is in receipt of means tested benefits such as Universal Credit and Council Tax support, or a member of your household is disabled;

- the domestic property you live in has an energy performance certificate (EPC) rating of D, E, F or G, or does not legally require an EPC.
